North Monterey County Unified School District serves 4,483 K-12 students in eight schools in the communities of Aromas, Castroville, Elkhorn, Prunedale, Royal Oaks, Moss Landing, & portions of Salinas, California. North Monterey County Unified joined the Research Practice Partnership with a 42.3% chronic absence rate at the end of 2021-22, which has improved to 28.5% in 2022-2023.

# **Team Composition**

### **Problem of Practice**

North Monterey County identified high rates of chronic absence among students with disabilities as their equity challenge. The district noticed the need for improving communication on the importance of attendance with families of students with disabilities to create a greater sense of belonging.



#### Goal

Reduce the number of chronically absent students with Individual Education Plans in TK-3 at two elementary schools by the end of the 2022-23 school year.




## **Strategies**

Team members hypothesized that if they welcomed students at the door, had empathy conversations with students, & conducted brief check-ins with students, they would improve students' sense of belonging. In addition, they agreed to conduct home visits with families to build a stronger sense of belonging & improve communication about the importance of attendance.




#### Results

Between January 2023 and January 2024, North Monterey County
Unified decreased its overall chronic absence rate by 8 percentage points. Their districtwide TK-3 rate decreased by more than 14 percentage points. The TK-3 rates at one focal school declined by 21.6 percentage points and 15.7 percentage points in the second school.
