Problem of Practice

Salinas City identified high rates of chronic absence among students with disabilities as their equity challenge. The district noted the need for greater engagement with families of students with disabilities to create a greater sense of belonging.



Goal

Reduce chronic absence rates for students with disabilities at one site from 50% to 35% by the end of the 2022-23 school year.




Strategies

Team members hypothesized that if they met one-onone or in small groups with students to set attendance goals and communicated those goals to teachers and families as a means of creating a support team would help ensure students achieved their goals. They also agreed to communicate the importance of attendance to families.




Results

Between January 2023 and January 2024, Salinas City reduced its overall chronic absence rate by 7.7 percentage points. Students with disabilities saw a nearly 10-percentage point decline districtwide and a slightly higher decline in the focal school.
